Genesis 37:3

"Now Israel loved Joseph more than any of his other sons, because he had been born to him in his old age; and he made an ornate robe for him.

Summary of Genesis

Part 1: Creation (Genesis 1-2)

1:27 — We are God's representatives in the world
1:29 — God asks humanity to partner with him to continue to form his creation
1:31 — Humans are to make his very good creation better

Part 2: The Fall (Genesis 3)

3:6-7 — We thought we could form the world better without God 3:22-24 — We are now subject to death

Part 3: The Problem (Genesis 4-11)

4 — Cain and Abel: Jealously and Murder
6-9 — Noah: Human Wickedness and God's Regret
11 — Tower of Babel: Human Pride

The Problem: God wants to <u>lovingly partner</u> with humanity to help make his very good creation better, but humanity keeps <u>refusing</u>.

Covenant: A <u>partnership</u> between two parties to accomplish a <u>goal</u> together

Part 4: The Messy Solution: Abraham's Family (Genesis 12-50)

Genesis 17:3-7 — God and Abram enter a covenant friendship Genesis 12:2-3 — The goal of the covenant is to bless the whole world

The Solution

God, by entering into a <u>covenant</u> relationship with a few who are called out from the many (Abraham's family), is going to <u>bless</u> the whole world.



The Hebrews are <u>special</u> because they have a <u>unique</u> relationship with God.

Joseph inherits every hurtful family pattern and is confronted with a question: Am I going to <u>perpetuate</u> my family's brokenness?

Genesis 42:1-28: Joseph's Brothers Go to Egypt

Genesis 42:22-24

Reuben replied, "Didn't I tell you not to sin against the boy? But you wouldn't listen! Now we must give an accounting for his blood." They did not realize that Joseph could understand them, since he was using an interpreter.

He turned away from them and began to weep, but then came back and spoke to them again. He had Simeon taken from them and bound before their eyes.

Genesis 43:29-30

As he looked about and saw his brother Benjamin, his own mother's son, he asked, "Is this your youngest brother, the one you told me about?" And he said, "God be gracious to you, my son." Deeply moved at the sight of his brother, Joseph hurried out and looked for a place to weep. He went into his private room and wept there.

Takeaways

Joseph is <u>conflicted</u> because changing family patterns is hard.

The story we have inherited is not the story we are determined to live.

Being a conduit of God's blessing in the world always involves <u>undoing</u> the brokenness we have <u>inherited</u>.

Small Group Questions

- 1. As young people, most of us have said something to the effect of "I will *never* turn out like my parents!" Which of their quirks, traits, or parenting "techniques" have you inherited anyway?
- 2. At least nine family patterns—some positive, some negative—affected Joseph (see above). Can you identify any family patterns—positive or negative—that have affected you? In what ways?
- 3. What would it look like to allow God to change the patterns you have inherited? Are you willing to allow God to do that?
- 4. How can we pray for you right now and throughout the week?
