Passage: Exodus 33:12-20 Parallel Passage: Acts 3:20-21

Jesus Sets Us Free

Passage: Acts 12:5-7 Parallel Passage: John 8:36

In your day to day life, do you ever feel stuck by some sort of hurt, habit, hang-up, or just boring routine? Perhaps it feels like you are simply going through the motions, checking off the boxes each day and doing your best to make it to the weekend so you can find "rest," even though it still leaves you feeling tired. Being chained down by the things that drain us is all too common, and is a struggle that all people go through at some point. Jesus has made a way for us to find freedom in Him through His death on the cross, and His heart breaks to see us in chains. There is no chain or prison that He can't bring us out of.

Waiting on God's Timing

Passage: John 11:1-44 Parallel Passage: Isaiah 55:8

Have you ever asked God to do something in a certain amount of time only to be left wondering if your prayers ever arrived? Maybe your prayers have gone like this, "fix my family today ... change my school this year ... bring me good friends soon ... heal our world immediately", but the time comes and the time goes and suddenly it feels like God has gone on a vacation and forgotten about you.

Our tendency is to look around at our circumstances, our lives, the world and say - I know exactly how to fix this and I know exactly when it needs to happen. We think we know best and so we tell God what to and when to do it. But we forget that God says, "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways." (Isaiah 55:8). <u>Simply put - God is different than we are and His timing is always</u> <u>perfect.</u> Mary and Martha knew they needed Jesus and they wanted Him to come immediately. But by the time Jesus arrived back in Judea, Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days and I can only imagine all of the grief that Mary and Martha were experiencing. They say repeatedly, "Jesus if you would have been here then..." Essentially - if you would have done what I asked when I asked it then this would not have happened.

But they had no idea what was about to come. Can you imagine the shock, joy and celebration that they experienced when they witnessed Lazarus return from the dead after FOUR DAYS? Yes, I am sure that Mary and Martha would have experienced joy if Jesus had come immediately and healed Lazarus, but nothing close to the amount of joy they experienced and the glory God received because Jesus chose to wait. And their waiting never meant that Jesus wasn't present, that He didn't hear their prayers or that He didn't love them. When we find ourselves in seasons of waiting, not understanding God's timing we must remind ourselves: Jesus is good. Jesus is present. Jesus loves you very much.

Father in Heaven,

I come before you with my heart filled with different thoughts and feelings. Deep down I wonder, why am I here? What's happening, Lord? But most of all, I wonder, where are you? But even as I pray that, I know you are right where you've always said you would be. You've never left me and you will never forsake me. You know why I am here waiting and you have promised to use it for your glory and my good. Forgive me for all my doubts, worries, fears, and impatience. I believe, help me in my unbelief! Help me to remember that it is good to wait for you. Grant me the joy that comes from knowing you and being known by you. Help me to remain faithful in this place of waiting for as long as it takes. Amen.

Spending Time With God

Passage: Psalm 16 Parallel Passage: Luke 10:38-42

When reading scripture, I think far too often we look at the words on the page and simply nod our heads and agree without thinking further into what is being said, and we don't engage our belief. For instance, when you read Psalm 16:11, "You make known to me the path of life; you will fill me with joy in your presence, with eternal pleasures at your right hand," do you truly believe that Jesus can fill you with joy when you spend time with Him? When we spend time in the Word, our mindset and how we position our hearts is super important. If we read through scripture treating it as a task that we need to mark off, reading the Bible becomes a slog of words on a page. But to spend time with Jesus takes some intentionality.

When spending time with Jesus, don't feel like it has to look a certain way. It doesn't have to be the aesthetically pleasing Instagram photo of a Bible in a coffee shop. What it does take though is making the time about Him. Like in the story of Mary and Martha in Luke 10:38-42, it means that we need to let go of all the details and things we need to do, and sit in His presence. That doesn't mean that the stuff we have going on isn't important, but rather that the one who is over our lives and the one who counsels us (v7) would love to help you carry it.

So, in knowing that, I want to give you a little encouragement and permission to do something. I want to give you the permission to let go of whatever is bothering you for **15 minutes**. What I want you to do is let go and close your eyes. Pray for God to slow you down and rest. Tell Him something you are thankful for, and if you feel like you can, tell Him that you love Him. Go on, do that RIGHT NOW, I'll wait.

Now, once you've done that, with a slow and open heart, read Psalm 16 again. What sticks out? What do you think of God? What does the Psalm say about God? Is there something in the Psalm you want to believe? If so, it looks like you have something else to talk to God about, and even something to ask the people you know.

Dear Lord,

show us how to live in a place where we are aware of our constant communion with You. As Your child I humbly come before You. Thank You that I get to rest under the shelter of Your wings, here in the secret place of Your presence. I praise You, and I worship You, Lord. I humbly hand over my heart to You, and I say, "Lord, here's my heart, search me and know me, show me anything in my life that is keeping me from being as close as I can be with You," Amen
